SJNA Resident Submission Highlight

Like moths to the... porch light?

Inspired by a recent presentation by Prof Douglas Tallamy, and noticing so many porch lights shining brightly all night long, I feel the urge to draw attention to the effects of light pollution on the insect world.

Outdoor light sources attract, then kill insects, including many beautiful moths that also pollinate fruit trees.

Some die directly, being incinerated or fatally injured on impact. Some become disoriented or blinded, and perish later from exhaustion and dehydration. Others collide with objects or are picked off by predators. Light damage also disrupts the insects' circadian rhythms and impacts their ability to forage, mate, and reproduce.

Like them or not, insects are vital to life on the planet as we know it. The loss of pollinators is not an option if we want to keep eating food. Of course it makes sense to have outdoor lights for both safety and security. Fortunately there are two ways to minimize light impact: Combining lights with a motion sensor, and replacing white light bulbs with yellow ones. It really is that easy!
